

World Water Day: Green Team visits PwC's water station

Since being Installed in November 2021, Golden Square quickly became one of the highest performing locations, recording 2,252 bottle fills in the first week alone. Even before the station could be unveiled, people were driving by and walking up asking to fill up their water bottles.

- PwC volunteers collected over 1,000 pounds (483.5 kg) of waste.




Recycling: Scrapman Waste and Recycling lunch 'n' learn




Blood Drive initiative


